As the father of two children new to the school (and regretful that my two at college will not have this opportunity!), I love to think about what they are learning now and how their own enthusiasms will be kindled and knowledge deepened. My wife, Jean, and I are excited to think that they may turn out like the thinkers and doers I have met so far. Experiential Learning Leads to Passion for Environmental Stewardship

Appreciation, knowledge and stewardship of the environment have been core elements of the curriculum since Poughkeepsie Day School's founding over 80 years ago. The environment provides a meaningful classroom for the best kind of learning at any age, from pre-kindergarten through senior year. By venturing into our local fields, rivers and farms, students experience nature first-hand, conduct real-world science and begin to understand their role in environmental conservancy. A relationship with nature cultivated during the lower school years grows into an inquiry-based

scientific study of the earth in middle school. The high school takes students to the next level, with deeper ecological studies and projects in sustainability that have real-world impact and encourage a growing passion for the environment.

PDS offers students many opportunities to expand their study of the environment beyond the classroom. Through partnerships with Sprout Creek Farm and the Poughkeepsie Farm Project, our lower school students assist with early morning chores, gardening, making butter and working with wool. In the fields and barns they learn about the seasonal growing cycle, land use, farm-to-table food production, composting and harvesting. Visits to Mohonk Preserve, Manitoga and Bowdoin Park help reveal the relationships between native peoples and the land. Students develop a deep knowledge of the Hudson River by sailing the sloop Clearwater and visiting Norrie Point Environmental Center and Esopus Meadow Preserve to support their classroom research on the animals and people that make the river their home.

A focus on water continues in middle school. In 2016, a three-day conference – "Is Water the New Oil?" – required students in grades 6 through 8 to consider whether water can be so polluted or the cycle so disrupted that in some parts of the world water is not renewable. Students developed presentations and built models illustrating where and by whom

water is used, along with solutions for the complex issues surrounding water. They engineered ways to move and filter water or abate runoff. They made empathic connections by reflecting on what it is like to live where water cannot be taken for granted. Working on behalf of The Water Project and Water for South Sudan, students wrote appeal letters to politicians and people in the entertainment and media industry, including Twenty One Pilots, New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio, Taylor Swift, Hillary Clinton, Bernie Sanders and *Poughkeepsie Journal* content strategist Kevin Lenihan.

After researching issues of water privatization, students debated the pros and cons in front of an audience of peers and teachers.

The conference reinforced PDS's ongoing commitment to experiential learning in the environment, from biodiversity studies to tree identification and energy in the forest ecosystem, gardening and soil studies. Active engagement in lab work, fieldwork and collaborative problem solving give students more than knowledge and skill development; they instill an understanding of the value of our natural resources and the desire to protect them and view them through an equitable lens.


Environmental work in high school encourages a more self-directed path through course work, service learning and internships. Students can immerse themselves in citizen science, ecology and evolution, animal behavior, geology and a unit on climate change and global warming.

Students have designed a citizen science campaign to monitor *Hemimysis anomala*, an invasive shrimp, with a centralized online database for the public to report sightings of expanding distribution. Service learning has brought our

young conservationists to the SUNY Cobleskill fish hatchery to help spawn fish, the Wolf Conservation Center in South Salem, NY, and to the Hudson River to count American glass eels and submit their data to the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. In a class of 30 graduating seniors, more students chose internships in environmental fields than any other. Last spring's senior internship placements included the Poughkeepsie Farm Project, the Cary Institute of Ecosystem Studies, the Hudson River sloop Clearwater, Save the Boundary Waters and WWOOF farming in Portugal.

Environmental stewardship and appreciation of the natural world are practiced on our campus's fields and wooded acres. In the south field, the middle school has created a way





station for fall migrations of the monarch butterfly, which supports the annual lower school study of its astonishing life cycle. Pre-K and Kindergarten study this life cycle by raising monarchs from caterpillars in the classroom. Grade 4 has engaged in a study of trees and seeds, while middle school students have planted two American chestnut trees to cross-pollinate with new resistant strains. Students in grade 3 practice giving back, in the way of the Eastern Woodlands peoples, by planting a "three sisters" garden of corn, beans and squash in the courtyard. These will be harvested and the new seeds planted by incoming grade 3 students. Tapping the sugar maples in our back woods to make syrup is a traditional early spring activity for lower school students. Campus recycling and composting programs are the result of efforts by high school students in the Environmental Club. High

schoolers have become teachers of younger PDS learners through the "Trout in the Classroom" project (see page 11).

Passion finds a purpose at PDS. Many of our students develop a passion for the environment from their first glimpse of a wolf at the conservation center, the long anticipated hatching of a monarch butterfly, the release of trout raised in the classroom or a run on the nature trail in the campus woods. Experiential learning in our curriculum has launched many of our students on a path of environmental endeavors after high school. Caitlin Chazen '00, Summer Praetorius '98 and Preston Kemeny '11, who are researching climate change; Ella Wise '06, who worked



at the Natural Resources Defense Council and is a city planner; and Matt Buccelli '06, who organizes international trips with a focus on smart energy – all are PDS alumni making a difference. And some 2016 graduates, like Elinor Stapylton and Anya Ptacek are coming up the environmental trail behind them.



Preston Cosslett Kemeny '11: Searching for Ancient Ice in Antarctica

"Be kind, have courage, stay curious." **Preston Cosslett Kemeny '11** lived up to this PDS motto during a grueling seven-week expedition to search for ancient ice in Antarctica.



On May 20, Preston spoke to students about his experience. Previously, a longstanding curiosity about the evolution of Earth's climate had taken Preston as far away as India to study fossilized soils that formed during periods of volcanic activity. This time, the focus was on how gases trapped in ice cores can help us understand glacial periods: Why have ice ages occurred roughly every 100,000 years during the recent past? Why did ice ages occur every 40,000 years previously? To find out, Preston, then a research specialist in the Department of Geosciences at Princeton University, joined a team of scientists in his department on a trip to Antarctica. It was mid-November 2015.

The landscape they saw on arrival was an impressive "vast expanse of white," looking untouched and unexplored. The team spent the first two weeks at McMurdo Station, an hour's flight from their final destination in the Allan Hills. They took a survival class and prepared "everything to keep us alive" in the unforgiving Antarctic climate. Photos of the team in coldweather clothing testified to the environment.

The team lived for seven weeks in five tents without running water. The orange geodesic dome tent where they drilled for ice samples was often filled with operatic music and laughter. Now back from the ice, some of the scientists are measuring properties of the gases contained in the ice; these measurements may reveal clues about the ancient atmosphere and how it has changed over time.

The stove they used for cooking provided heat that helped avoid hypothermia, but also required care to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. And "it was shocking the amount of ice we needed to stay hydrated," Preston said. Also shocking was the amount of food consumed to maintain calories burned in the frigid environment. Their diet of frozen vegetables, meat and carbohydrates was typically rounded out with snacks of "15 cookies, 12 Cheez-its® and multiple chocolate bars."

Students asked about social dynamics. "We took care of ourselves and each other and looked out for any development of frostbite," Preston told them, emphasizing the importance of kindness and working to maintain a positive social climate.

Preston's return to PDS was like a homecoming. Former teachers treated him like a colleague, students gave him "high-fives" of approval and, having taken many of Jonathan Heiles's science courses himself, Preston clearly enjoyed discussing the process of conducting scientific research with Jonathan's advanced experimental science class. After the visit, Preston was thrilled to receive letters from sixth graders excited to learn more about Antarctica.

"I learned not to reject things out of hand because I don't understand them, how to go about working and critically thinking about new ideas."

The foundation for Preston's adventures in science and his interest in environmental stewardship was formed at PDS. In 2008 he helped launch the Enviro-Club and appreciated that "PDS was welcoming to many of our initiatives." A student-built recycling bin, disposable cups replaced by a mug share and even the upcoming installation of a solar array – all are projects conceived during Preston's leadership. He remembers that teachers at PDS "got people thinking about the material and how things are linked." And although he enjoys the structure of researching in an organized lab with targeted questions, it was "having the freedom to explore a lot of different things that made me open to having new experiences."

Preston is currently completing the first year of a Ph.D. in geochemistry at the California Institute of Technology.

Class Notes

After graduating from PDS, **Elisabeth Barnett '71** worked for many years in international development and U.S. social services. In 2000, she launched her current career as an education researcher and now works at Teachers College, Columbia University where she studies high school-to-college transition, community colleges and career technical education. "Sometimes," she says, "I think back on PDS's unique educational approach and wish that more students could experience something like it."

Michael Gold '73 stopped by PDS and filled us in on what he has been up to. After graduating from Bard College, he earned a Ph.D. in Jazz Performance at NYU. He spent many years as a jazz bassist in NYC and had the good fortune to play with such greats as Lee Konitz, Al Cohn, Tal Farlow, Sheila Jordan, Jon Hendricks and Warne Marsh. In 2000, he founded Jazz Impact, which uses jazz as a generative metaphor for understanding the dynamics that spark creative energy in organizations: leadership, team dynamics, innovation and sustainability. In 2008, he received The Paul D. Fleck Fellow Award from The Banff Centre for Creative Leadership for outstanding work in the emerging field of arts-based learning for business. Says Michael, "It is fair to say that PDS had a lot to do with my capacity to think and communicate across disciplines. I hope I am able to impart some aspect of that unique perspective with every group I work with."

After almost six years developing new products (including apps, mobile websites and interactive learning programs) at the *Harvard Business Review*, **Andrew Innes '87** is now a full-time game developer for his own company, Anomia Press. The adult version is coming out this fall, with a children's version due out in spring 2017 and other thematic expansions to follow. Anomia Press games are widely available throughout North America and have been

The worldwide team of scientists recently announced they had made the first direct gravitational wave observation, which fulfilled the last prediction of Einstein's general theory of relativity. John is an associate professor in the Rochester Institute of Technology School of Mathematical Sciences and Center for Computational Relativity and Gravitation. He is the principal investigator of RIT's group in the LIGO Scientific Collaboration.

Karali Pitzele '91 is currently director and trainer at Transformative Schools Educational Design. She creates teacher development and evaluation systems, as well as school evaluation systems and principal training materials for a franchise of 11 schools in Indonesia that focus on student-driven and project-based learning.

Shirley Rinaldi: In Appreciation

After a long career at Poughkeepsie Day School, and before that, St. George's School (in Poughkeepsie) and before that, in Scotland, **Shirley Rinaldi** said farewell to her last class as a full-time teacher. What contributions has this master teacher made to our community?

Shirley didn't worry about curriculum "coverage" in her classes. For Shirley, coverage is for bathing suits in the Lands' End catalogue, for sandwich makers and cake decorators, for the New York Times and CNN. But in a school like ours, coverage hardly describes what teachers do, which is create learning environments and meaningful experiences for students. So what did Shirley do? She uncovered! Shirley designed learning environments and activities around traditional subjects and asked students to apply them to the real world, connecting with individual interests and encouraging collaboration with each other. Shirley uncovered the world and brought it to her students: through Skype, blogs, Twitter and her own experiences – a trip to China, trips to Scotland, her many hobbies and the love of her own family.

She also showed unflagging optimism about the futures of her students. Many a parent nervously entering a meeting with Shirley on a subject of concern would leave reassured



and wanting to hug her. The ability to describe a difficult picture while still allowing parents to feel positive stems from a belief in her students that is palpably sincere.

PDS believes that the success of our program – in building our students' confidence in their abilities as well as their families' confidence in the program's effectiveness in helping students develop those abilities – requires teachers who think globally and have a passion for learning, leading and living. Shirley demonstrates the PDS mission every day, and I can't imagine that she leaves it behind when she pulls out of the parking lot, or that she will demonstrate it only on a part-time basis next year.

Thank you, Shirley, for all that you've done for PDS, and on behalf of everyone here whose life you have touched.

Noteworthy - Sustainable

5th Grade Make Their Mark with Recycling Program

Dorothy Luongo's grade 5 class has joined schools across North America to implement a school-wide marker recycling program. The marker "take-back" program was started



by Sun Valley School in California and has support from the Dixon-Ticonderoga and Crayola companies. Students explained the recycling and repurposing initiative to the lower school during morning meeting with a video and a skit. They placed recycling bins throughout the school for all brands of markers, highlighters and dry erase markers. The class has partnered with Crayola's ColorCycle program, which pays to receive shipments of the markers. Each dry marker in its entirety will be used to create fuel. To date, approximately 500 markers have been recycled through this program at PDS.

Underwater explorer, writer and photographer Anne Doubilet



visited with students in grades 4 through 12 on October 5, 2015. Voyaging from the bottom to the top of the world across four decades, Anne has witnessed nearly unthinkable environmental changes that challenged her world-view and inspired her advocacy of project HOPE: Help Ocean Protect Earth. She presented photographs of coral reefs, animals and people from Japan, Australia, the Red Sea, the Arctic, Antarctica and Papua New Guinea to illustrate "what we have, what we have lost and what we stand to lose." She urged students to use their skills and passions to sustain the natural resources we have left.

Cheetah Conservation Fund

On September 24, 2016, Paola Bari, artist, IT specialist for IBM and board of trustee member of the Cheetah Conservation Fund, spoke to high school students on the need to save the world's fastest land animal and Africa's most endangered cat: the cheetah. Students learned that the CCF, located in Namibia, is the world's leading organization dedicated



to saving cheetahs in the wild. CCF works with farmers to investigate, develop and implement predator-friendly livestock and wildlife management techniques. CCF is also restoring cheetah habitat through its Bushblok initiative: harvesting and recycling encroaching thorn bushes into compact logs of biomass fuel for cooking and home heating.

Trout in the Classroom

The inaugural PDS Trout in the Classroom program connected high school students with young learners.



Students raised trout from eggs to young adult fry, monitored water quality in the tanks and engaged in a stream habitat study. Students also gained an understanding of ecosystems as well as an appreciation of water resources and the importance of a conservation ethic. As part of their Community Service and Environmental Outreach course, high school students spawned the fish at the SUNY-Cobleskill Fish Hatchery. Ellie Stapylton '16 and Kate McKeon '17 played leadership roles by teaching lessons on trout conservation and outreach with grades 1, 2, 5 and middle school science students. Their hard work was celebrated on "Happy Free Day!" when a total of 170 fish were released into Wappingers Creek.

Nature's Classroom

Grade 7 returned to Becket, MA, for its annual weeklong sojourn with Nature's Classroom, a residential environmental studies program. They hiked snowy trails to search out



secrets of the forest, such as how to track animals and identify anything not covered by snow. They learned how to create skin care products with fruit, vegetables and yogurt and how to make tea with forest plants. They learned how to treat injuries sustained in the wild and were challenged to reduce their food waste. They also collaborated in groups on a bridge-building competition and egg dropping contest and studied the physics involved in roller coasters.

ROVs:Remotely Operated Vehicles with Cameras

Thanks to grants from the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley, PDS purchased two ROVs to greatly enhance our robotics program and science curriculum. Students who volunteer with the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) eel monitoring and conservation program

will use the devices to monitor fish behavior and help log water quality data. The Invasive Species Research Team used ROVs this summer during their investigation of the ecology and distribution of an invasive aquatic invertebrate, the bloody red shrimp. Pre-K through grade 12 students in the Trout in the Classroom program will analyze



live video feeds from an ROV in our trout tank. ROVs will also aid students sampling aquatic organisms at Vassar College's Sunset Lake

Hudson River Study

The yearlong grade 2 study of the Hudson River is a significant part of the lower school experience. Students immerse themselves in the history, wildlife, ecology, art and lore of the Hudson. Classes work with many organizations and experts, including the Clearwater, NYS DEC, water treatment plant operators, fishermen, a tugboat captain and educators at Norrie Point Environmental Center and Scenic



Hudson. Students research the river's wildlife, build a 3D model of the river including its banks, boats, lighthouses and people, engineer different types of bridges out of popsicle sticks and create Japanese-style prints of native fish. This year, through a collaboration with Arm-of-the-Sea Theater, their study culminated in a puppet show depicting the history of the Hudson River and the importance of keeping its waters clean.

Invasive Species Research Team

The PDS invasive species research team spent the week of June 19 at Hobart and William Smith (HWS) Colleges engaged in their ongoing work to track the spread and ecological impact




of an aquatic invasive invertebrate, bloody-red shrimp, on New York State waterways. Through the assistance of grants from the Finger Lakes PRISM (Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management) and Great Lakes Protection Fund, the team is exploring novel early detection techniques, including environmental DNA and citizen science net and trap monitoring, to gain a deeper understanding of how and where the species is spreading and how to educate the public on ways to prevent further expansion. The work represents a collaboration between HWS and Ithaca College with high school science teacher Brent Boscarino and PDS interns: Mia Foucek '16, Elinor Stapylton '16, Chris Canfield '17, Anni Gundeck '17, Johnson Lin '17, Kate McKeon '17, Sonomi Oyagi '17, Leif Grinnell '18, Erik Hedlund '18, Matt Warren '18, Ava Fisherman '19 and PDS graduate Julia Roellke '15.

Enviromental Club

The high school Environmental Club launched a number of projects to help move towards a greener PDS environment in 2015–2016. One primary initiative involved a collaboration between the club and members of the Building and Design intensive study course, headed by HS math teacher Li Pipman Denaut. They built a reusable mug rack, constructed entirely of recycled materials, to hang in the dining room. Their goal was to allow students and faculty to choose an alternative to disposable coffee and tea cups. Participants

could select a mug at the beginning of the week, hang it on a personally labeled location on the rack and reuse the mug throughout the week. Environmental Club members were responsible for dishwashing these mugs, generously donated by





Greening, Gardening and Composting

Middle school students took on the challenge of redirecting dining room food waste, from landfills to a more ecologyaligned destination. Their solution was to set up a sorting station in the dining room to collect food waste. Their efforts resulted in a remarkable 900 pounds collected over a period of 18 weeks. The food waste was sent to Bradley Farm in New Paltz, with a delivery to owner Ray Bradley's "girls" (chickens) every Friday. To understand the breakdown of food in an anaerobic environment, students built mini-landfills and visited a recycling facility. Warm weather brought students into the school gardens to weed and sow seeds and learn about germination and plant growth while sharing this knowledge with their lower school gardening buddies. Their efforts not only improved our recycling program and the garden's pleasing aesthetic, but have produced a bountiful harvest this fall.

PDS continues to support faculty and staff in its mission to develop lifelong learners with a passion for learning, leading and living. Throughout 2015–2016, teachers from all academic divisions, as well as administrators and staff, engaged in a wide range of learning and leadership activities. - Love is a moment in time. The rest is a lifetime of learning to grow.
- If someone around you is sad, don't ask why. Just be there through the other side. Help with your heart, not your mind.
- When you apologize, don't make excuses.
 Acknowledge your faults.
- In all that you think, do and say, do good. You will give yourself peace of mind.

Commencement speaker **Daniel Rechtschaffen '98** cited the class of 2016's devotion to social justice and environmental causes and encouraged graduates to open their eyes and hearts and allow themselves to be in love with this planet, even though it can be painful. He said, "You are being sent into a world of unspeakable beauty and unspeakable struggle. I want you to be brave enough to fall in love with this heartbreaking world...to fail beautifully. You won't be able to fix this world, but by trying again and again you will live a life of meaning. If you keep loving, you will always be filled with love. If you keep striving to be your best, you will always be your best."

Honoring the Legacy of Two Courageous Leaders

Tony Buccelli, Head of School 1991-2001

In 1991, Tony Buccelli was hired with a specific charge: to fund a new building to accommodate our growing student



body on our Vassar-leased campus. Only two months into his headship, he received notice that Vassar would not renew our lease. He did not flinch. Within two years, he raised \$3.1 million and moved the middle and high schools to Kenyon. Two years later he had acquired and refurbished Gilkeson, adding a completely new athletics facility, now officially named

the Anthony Buccelli Athletics Facility. A few years later, he secured funds to create our James Earl Jones Theater complex and oversaw the successful physical relocation of PDS to its current campus – all while engaging with each student, leading the faculty in honoring the PDS progressive legacy and keeping it relevant.

Josie Holford, Head of School 2006-2016

With profound gratitude, we bid farewell this year to Josie Holford, whose charge was to continue the growth of the school and its programs. In her first two years, Josie worked with the board, faculty and community to develop and implement a robust strategic plan. The 2008–2009



economic downturn forced a shift in strategic expectations. Undaunted, Josie raised the stature of the school through assertive expansion of its social media presence, redesign of the PDS website, her highly regarded blog and activities in state and local associations.

She embraced a program to admit international students. She championed and expanded the role of technology as a medium for students to connect globally and faculty to teach creatively. As facilities were updated, Josie

reimagined their use, recognizing that spaces can liberate learning in extraordinary ways.

Nowhere was this more evident than in her vision for the space currently occupied by the middle school, where students and teachers are freed by the space to flow and morph into communities of learners who follow where learning leads. The idea for this space evolved in partnership with teachers, a process fundamental to Josie's understanding of how ideas inform actions. At our 2016 auction, this space was officially named the Holford Learning Commons.

True leaders leave footprints. Courageous leaders, in times of unexpected change, leave giant footprints. Tony and Josie were such leaders.

Kenyon House, built in 1913, was once the mansion on the "Cliffdale" estate of industrialist Clarence Kenyon, known for establishing factories to take workers out of home sweatshops. His daughter, Helen Kenyon, a Vassar College alumna, was a vigorous fundraiser for her alma mater and the first woman elected chair of the Vassar College board of trustees. She was active in the community and a fighter for the underprivileged with interests in education, religion, politics, public welfare and community progress. The estate was bought by IBM in 1944. The mansion served IBM as a research laboratory and later as a guest house and education center. Purchased by PDS in 1995, Kenyon House is home to the high school and administrative offices. Through their generous gifts to advance Poughkeepsie Day School, members of the Kenyon Society epitomize the activism and commitment of the Kenyons.




In Memoriam

Scott Meyer


